At MTA, we:

- ❖ Inspire a love and excitement for learning within our students, leading to the development of analytical and linguistic skills in mastering both Limudei Kodesh and General Studies curricula.
- ❖ Foster character development and ethical personality traits through an inclusive environment of respect for all members of the school community.
- ❖ Foster intellectual honesty, curiosity, and awareness, and an understanding of people and events that shape the world around us, in accordance with the Torah's point of view.
- ❖ Imbue the students with love of Hashem, Torah, Klal Yisroel, Eretz Yisroel, and our Mesorah.

THE FIVE GUIDING PRINCIPLES OF PARENT-SCHOOL PARTNERSHIP AT MTA

1. **Parenting** – parents can support their children's education by providing a healthy home environment. As partners, we help parents by offering parenting workshops, helping our families find needed support programs, and encouraging them to model pro-education behavior.
2. **Communicating** – parents can be proactive about finding out what is happening in the classroom and in school. As partners, we keep parents informed and make it easy for them to ask questions or express concerns. We hold parent-teacher conferences, send out regular communications via phone calls, e-mails or memos describing the work we're doing in the classroom, and make ourselves available to take parent calls and parent-teacher meetings (with an administrator present, if needed).
3. **Volunteering** - One of the most direct ways for parents to involve themselves in their children's education is to volunteer in the classroom and/or school. We cordially invite parents to help out in the classroom and encourage volunteer opportunities within the school, such as assisting in the classroom, helping out with office work, teaching extra-curricular subjects, running concessions at fairs, etc.
4. **Learning at Home** - Parents and other family members can be great educational resources for students. To help parents provide at-home learning, we keep them informed about projects and (optional) homework assignments. Additionally, we send home lists of voluntary reading and other activities that can help parents ensure their children have ways to learn outside of the classroom.
5. **Collaborating on Decision-Making** – We encourage parents to collaborate with their children's teachers in the education of their children. We encourage parents to join the PTA/PTO, as well.

MTA PARENT-STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

Arrival *(Principles 1,5)*

All our students begin their day with Davening. Davening time is a special time to communicate with Hashem. Please drop off your child by 8:15 AM so they won't miss this precious time.

Attendance *(Principles 1,2)*

At MTA, extra care is taken to individualize attention for each student. When a child misses a day of learning, their learning progress is slowed. Please keep your child's learning consistent by maintaining a consistent attendance record.

Birthdays *(Principles 1,2,4,5)*

- Parents having a birthday party for their child outside of school are asked to invite all students in their child's class. This helps foster Ahavas Yisroel among our students.
- Parents making a celebration in school should please adhere to the following guidelines:
 1. Contact your child's teacher one week in advance of the party to coordinate timing.
 2. No food, other than fresh fruit and fresh vegetables, may be brought in from home.
 3. If you wish to serve something other than fruit and vegetables, you may pay a \$50 party fee, and MTA will provide fruit, cupcakes, and paper goods for the class; or alternatively, you may provide cupcakes from Winn Dixie in Aventura or an approved local Kosher establishment. No goodie bags or candy may be brought into school. Please contact **the main office** with any questions regarding this policy.

Books *(Principles 1,4,5)*

Students are responsible for keeping track of any books brought home. Parents are responsible for replacing any lost book as soon as possible. It is a great lesson in accountability when children are held accountable for their books and schoolwork.

Communication *(Principles 2,5)*

At the beginning of the school year, your children's teachers will share their contact information with you. Generally, all administrators and teachers are available during business hours and will do their best to communicate with you during their breaks. (Please note: Teachers will be unable to answer calls or messages during teaching hours.) You may also call the school office at (954) 526-5253 or email office@MTAcademy.org. Administrators can be reached via the school office, as well.

School communications/reminders as well as pictures of special events will be emailed or posted via the school WhatsApp chat. The links for the chats will be emailed in the welcome email. (Please note: The Official School Whatsapp chat is an "admin only" chat and for administrative postings only.)

Discipline (Principles 1,2,5)

At MTA, our Discipline Plan includes focus on the following student behaviors:

- Respect for Self
- Respect for Others/Respect Authority
- Respect for Property

Students who have difficulty adhering to any of these three guidelines will be redirected with problem-solving skill building. Repeated violations will result in a conference with the parents to develop an action plan for the student. Please note: Our children's safety is our utmost priority.

Therefore, if a student violates a Safety Protocol, we may request for them to be picked up immediately, and an action plan may be mandated before being allowed back in school.

Dismissal (Principles 2,5)

Dismissal is at 4:00 PM from Monday through Thursday, and 1:30 PM on Fridays. **NEW: Half Day dismissal is at 1:30 PM.** Please be courteous and pick your children up on time. If there is an extenuating circumstance, please contact the office and let us know as soon as feasible.

Please wait in the parking lot and remain in your car during dismissal. A teacher will bring your children to you. Please help facilitate a smooth dismissal process by neither socializing nor taking care of school matters during dismissal.

Children may only be picked up by their parent/guardian or other authorized person. Authorized persons may be asked to provide a photo ID to verify identification.

Dress Code (Principles 1,5)

As we are a מקום תורה, a place of Torah learning, our children are expected to dress in a way befitting of the learning we do every day. As such, we have a Dress Code to assist in fostering this sense of respect and awe. Please note the Dress Code Document attached

- ❖ Dress Code for Boys: Collared shirts of any solid color, with no logos, or branding. Black or dark blue long school pants (dress, chinos). Tzitzis and Yarmulke. No jewelry of any kind.
- ❖ Middle School Boys: Collared, button down shirts.
- ❖ Dress Code for Girls: Collared, long-sleeved or ¾ sleeved shirts of any solid color, with no branding or logos. Long black or navy blue pleated uniform skirt that falls below the knee when seated. Leggings may be worn under their skirts but may not be worn alone.
 - Hair and jewelry should be simple & refined, reflective of a Bas Yisroel. Fake nails, multiple piercings, and makeup are not permitted.
- ❖ Socks and closed-toed shoes are required to be worn by all students, including Kindergarten (loafers, sneakers).
- ❖ Sweatshirts must be a solid color with no words of any kind. Hoods may not be worn on school premises.
- ❖ Rosh Chodesh: White Shirts should be worn

We urge you to follow the guidelines carefully so as not to put your child in an uncomfortable position. MTA reserves the right to enforce a dress standard that is in accordance with the characteristics of a ben/bas Torah, even if it is not specified above.

NOTE: We respect that our MTA parents come from various backgrounds and levels of observance. We request all parents honor the wholesome Torah environment that permeates our school, including during drop-off and pick-up, by respecting the standards of the school and to arrive dressed appropriately for a Torah institution, including fully covered hair, skirts that cover knees, and socks/tights. Please ensure that if your nanny, babysitter etc. comes to the school for any reason, she too is dressed in an appropriate manner, in accordance with MTA's standards.

Food *(Principles 1,5)*

Everyone needs healthy nutrition to fuel their day. Please do your best to pack healthful, nutritious, and nourishing food for your child. (Please note: Due to various concerns, including allergies, we ask that children not share snacks.)

Health Records *(Principles 1,2,5)*

Florida State law mandates that all students must have valid immunization records. Please submit the appropriate forms from your pediatrician or, in the case of an exemption, from your county health department. The blue and yellow forms from your pediatrician are also required. Forms must be submitted before the beginning of the school year.

Homework *(Principles 1,2,4,5)*

At MTA, our homework policy is unique. We take pride in providing our children with a comprehensive and differentiated education during school hours. Work and study completed at home can enrich and supplement your child's education but is not mandatory. As your partner in educating your child, MTA may provide enriching suggestions for work at home, and it is you, as the parents, who have the agency to take the opportunity to explore this work. (Please note: There may be times when children will be responsible for projects to be done at home, and/or other work from home, at the teacher's discretion.) Middle school students will be assigned homework as necessary to prepare them adequately for High School curricula.

Screen Time and Entertainment *(Principles 1,2,5)*

Students may not bring electronic devices, such as tablets, phones, or any other personal electronic devices to school. Any books outside of your children's curriculum must be pre-approved to be brought into school. To approve a book, please email Mrs. Hirsch at shirsch@MTAcademy.org.

Please note: Many of our families have homes where there is limited access to pop culture. In support of this, and to ensure everyone feels welcome and their sensitivities respected, we

encourage our students to discuss topics other than movies, television shows, YouTube videos, et al. at MTA. Please make sure your child is aware of this policy and understands the reason.

Selling

Selling snacks is not permissible in school. We encourage children to explore their entrepreneurial side in other ways!

Sick Child Policy and First Aid *(Principles 1,2,5)*

One of the most serious challenges facing schools is preventing illness. We request that a child who is ill should please not come to school. We realize that this can be an inconvenience for parents, and we trust that you will understand the necessity for such a policy and assist us by adhering to it. As per this policy, we require that your child be free of symptoms of illness: fever, diarrhea, or vomiting for at least 24 hours without the aid of medication. MTA reserves the right to require a doctor's statement before the child can be readmitted to the school. Please notify us immediately if your child has been exposed to a communicable disease.

If a child in school appears to be ill, has a fever, or is otherwise unable to participate in class, arrangements should please be made to pick him/her up in a timely manner. (Please note: We cannot provide internal medicine. The first aid that we can administer is limited to cleaning and bandaging wounds.)

If ch"v emergency care is needed, and we are unable to reach the parent or emergency contact, we will have the child taken to an emergency room immediately and contact the child's primary physician on file.

School Closure *(Principle 2)*

At MTA, we recognize that Torah is not just a subject; it's a way of life. Consistency in Torah Learning is of the utmost importance. While taking into consideration the decisions made by Broward County, we will evaluate the decision based on the merits of the information that we have available to our administrative team. This will include weather forecasts, community reporting, consultation with Daas Torah, and a variety of other factors. This may lead to more of a "wait-and-see" approach to school closures, which means that we may go to sleep with the assumption that Yeshiva WILL be open, knowing that there is a possibility that we may decide to close early in the morning, based on an evaluation of our campus, and the learning environment. Of course, the safety of our children and families is our highest priority, and in cases of hurricanes and the like, we will be sure to follow the guidelines put forth by our state and local governments.

We will notify parents as soon as we can, and while the 'unknown' can be stressful during those times, we appreciate your support in providing our children a stable and enriching environment for learning. Every day is precious, and the positive effects of the children seeing that closing Yeshiva is a weighty matter that needs to be carefully decided, is limitless.

Toy Policy *(Principle 5)*

Students are discouraged from bringing toys to school. It can be distracting and often results in lost or broken toys. The school provides equipment, games, and toys for children to play, both,

during outdoor recess and indoor class time. Theft or loss of any toys will not be investigated by school administration.

Tuition *(Principles 2,5)*

Tuition fees are assessed based on the arrangements made when you signed up through our online portal (FACTS). There are no discounts or reimbursements for days missed due to illness, absences, vacation, severe weather, emergencies, during the holidays when school is closed, or should you decide to withdraw. Please see your enrollment agreement for more details.

Visitor and Volunteer Policy *(Principles 3,5)*

We encourage parental involvement in every aspect of your child's education. Visitors and volunteers are always welcome. Please note, for the safety of our students and teachers we ask that all visitors coordinate with the office in advance.

We are honored that you have chosen MTA to partner with you in educating your children. We look forward to guiding your children's growth in Torah, Avodah, and G'milus Chasadim. The education of a child is a joint effort between the school, parents, and HaKadosh Baruch Hu. When the school and the parents are on the same page, the child benefits exponentially. We look forward to working with you and with HaKadosh Baruch Hu in the avodas hakodesh of educating our children.
